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1. Introduction

This student handbook serves as your guide to the study of the Master of Social Sciences in Public Policy and Risk Governance (MSocSc-PPRG) Programme. The MSocSc-PPRG Programme offers core modules, thematic elective modules and general elective modules that will provide you with both foundation and a range of modules which best suits your interest and preference.

2. Aims of the Programme

The MSocSc-PPRG Programme provides comprehensive knowledge in the policy process with a strategic focus on risk governance. The aim of this Programme is to nurture students to develop a sophisticated understanding of public policy institutions and processes, its implications on policy development and implementation, as well as innovative policy recommendations to complex policy issues in an ever-changing risk society.

3. Programme Objectives

The Programme aims to:

- ➤ Instill in students the theoretical and interdisciplinary expertise necessary for the practice of risk governance in public policy;
- ➤ Gain broad and deep knowledge of the public policymaking processes in which decisions about risks are taken and implemented;
- ➤ Demonstrate knowledge of research principles and methodologies relevant to public policy studies from the perspective of risk governance;
- ➤ Acquire the analytics managerial skills in public sector that can be applied to developing innovative solutions to a broad range of risk problems in policy issues; and
- Reflect critically on the challenges relating to risk governance on the management, implementation and evaluation of public policies and respond to these in innovative ways.

4. Programme Intended Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the Programme, you should be able to:

- Critically examine key theoretical and analytical perspectives and debates in risk and public policy studies;
- > Develop a risk-based approach in understanding the public policy institutions and processes and its implications on policy development and implementation;
- Conduct risk analysis and public policy research using appropriate research methods;
- Apply skills and knowledge acquired in the curriculum to analyse various policy issues; and
- ➤ Devise innovative and professional policy recommendations to complex policy problems in a changing risk society.

5. Programme Structure and Curriculum

Students enrolled in MSocSc-PPRG must complete at least 8 modules (24 credits) in their course of study: 4 core modules and 4 elective modules (one of which must be taken from the three thematic elective modules). Each module bears 3 credits.

7. Student Conduct: Assessment, Attendance Policy and Academic Honesty

7.1 Assessment

The assessment for a module normally comprises continuous assessment and final assessment. It will be competency-based and grade-related in nature.

There may be a number of components of assessed work for each module, such as participation, essay, assignment, oral presentation, project, report, test, examination, etc. The results from each component of assessed work shall be aggregated according to specific weightings to produce a final grade for a module.

Assessment of individual component of assessed work of each module shall follow the Outcome-based Teaching and Learning (OBTL) module assessment rubrics.

7.2 Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend all timetabled classes and stipulated learning activities and be punctual in order to achieve the best learning outcomes. A student will be deemed as absent from class if s/he

- (a) fails to seek prior approval from the module teacher for not attending the full lesson with a valid reason; or
- (b) fails to attend the timetabled class within the first 15 minutes; or
- (c) fails to satisfy the specific attendance requirements set by respective module teachers and made clear to students in advance.

7.3 Academic Honesty

The University upholds academic integrity and adopts zero tolerance to academic frauds. Dishonesty in completing assignments, assessments and examinations, including plagiarism and cheating, is liable to possible disciplinary actions.

"Plagiarism" is defined as an act that comprises borrowing the work of others, including printed and online resources, as one's own work without proper citation or acknowledgement. The use of other's work may include such practices as copying source materials, paraphrasing or translation of source materials, citing other's work without proper citations or acknowledgements, paraphrasing the author's ideas, etc.

Examples of specific academic misconduct include but not limited to:

- (a) Cheating during examinations;
- (b) Using unauthorized materials or communication devices during examinations;
- (c) Violating the rules and regulations of examinations;
- (d) Engaging anyone to take an examination on one's behalf;
- (e) Passing off work done by any one as one's own work;
- (f) Submitting the same assignment for two different modules;
- (g) Copying materials without proper acknowledgment;
- (h) Translating or paraphrasing source materials;
- (i) Citing other's work without proper citations or acknowledgements;
- (j) Fabricating information or data for research or provide fabricated information or facts;
- (k) Fabricating analyses or their results;
- (l) Revising data to arrive at desirable results for analyses; and
- (m) Selectively reporting the results for analyses, etc.

All students are required to use the VeriGuide software for originality check before submitting an assignment and the originality check report should be submitted with the assignment. The submission date of the assignment and the VeriGuide check, whichever is later, would be taken as the final submission date of the assignment.

8. Graduation Requirements

8.1 MSocSc-PPRG Award Requirements

In order to be granted an award of the University, students must successfully complete a programme of the University, including specific requirements of the named award for which they are registered, general University requirements and the minimum cumulative GPA requirement.

To be eligible for the award of the Master of Social Sciences in Public Policy and Risk Governance, students are required to complete and pass a minimum of 24 credits (8 modules), including four core modules and four elective modules (at least one module must be chosen from the thematic elective modules) as laid down in the programme curriculum.

8.2 Award Classification

A student who satisfies the conditions for graduation from the MSocSc-PPRG Programme shall be awarded a postgraduate qualification with one of the following classifications:
